#### Playworks Program at Miner Elementary

There are two program options:

#### Option 1: Full Program - \$30,000 a year

Funds a full-time youth development specialist at the school. This specialist is in addition to – and complementary to – the PE teacher; they do not replace PE. They oversee recess and support the following four activities:

- 1. Class game time: they meet with each class twice a month to do a social and learning curriculum via play
- 2. Afterschool leagues: they support clubs such as basketball, volleyball, etc., that are more developmental than competitive
- 3. Ongoing support to teachers: Throughout the school year working with teachers to shifting interaction from monitoring to engagement
- 4. Leadership program: Facilitates a leadership program for 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> graders to lead and facilitate play and games with other students

*Pros/Cons:* This is the most robust program. It is less burdensome on current staff because it does not require a current staff member to add these duties to their workload. However, because it is led by someone outside of the school, it is less likely to be integrated into the climate and culture of the school. It is more expensive and more difficult to fund, and less likely to be sustainable because it would need to be funded every year.

#### Option 2: Partial Program - \$16,000 a year

The principal will need to identify a teacher/staff member in the school who will be trained to facilitate and supervise recess. Playworks provides a site coordinator who will be on site at the school for one week a month to train and support the recess point person. The site coordinator will also provide training for other recess duty staff.

*Pros/Cons:* This program is preferred because it is more likely to integrate the playworks approach into the culture and climate of the school, making it a more sustainable option. However, it requires Miner to identify a staff member for whom playworks is their responsibility.

#### DC Physical Activity for Youth (DC PAY) Grant - \$10,000

The DC Office of the State Superintendent for Education (OSSE) offers an annual \$10,000 grant for schools to increase their capacity to offer physical activity to students before, during, or after the school day. The 2017-18 grant cycle should open in March. We can apply for this grant to fund the partnership with Playworks, and then find other funding for the remaining costs.

- LSAT budget priority survey found that parents strongly supported all four budget priorities from SY16-17:
  - Community School Model
  - Improving reading scores
  - Improving climate & culture
  - Reggio Emilia in ECE and K
- Additional priorities identified in parent & staff surveys:
  - STEM instruction
  - Improving math scores
  - Classroom technology (computers & projectors)
- Based on these inputs and LSAT discussions, Principal Mial developed 3 budget options.
- LSAT deliberated the options and provided a recommendation to Principal Mial
- Principal Mial submitted a proposed SY17-18 budget to DCPS
